NEW SINAI CANCER BUILDING

We're raising \$20 million for the three-story, \$95 million Mandy and Dennis Weinman Cancer Building. The Weinman Cancer Building will house all outpatient cancer services in one convenient location on the Sinai campus. The co-location of cancer treatment and "wrap-around" patient services ensures strong communication among physicians and eases the burden on weakened patients and those caring for them during this difficult time.



EXPANDED SIMULATION LABS

We're investing in our team members and students with renovated and expanded simulation labs across the system at Carroll, Northwest, and Sinai hospitals. These unique learning spaces allow for training in a safe and controlled environment. At a total cost of \$7.9 million, these labs will ultimately impact patient care.





RENOVATED AND EXPANDED SINAI EMERGENCY DEPARTMENT

To better serve our patients, care partners, and clinicians, we're doubling the size of our ED. With a \$50 million total project cost, we're raising \$20 million – renovating 33,500 square feet, and constructing 36,600 square feet. This additional space will allow us to continue providing state-of-the-art emergency care to all who need it.



NEW REGIONAL MEDICAL CAMPUS

The George Washington University School of Medicine and Health Sciences is establishing a Regional Medical Campus at Sinai Hospital. We're raising money to support this exciting partnership that will help recruit top clinical talent to train with our world-class physicians and potentially stay on to practice in the area.

NEW SINAI CANCER BUILDING

Currently, our cancer services are located in different parts of the hospital and health system. The new Mandy and Dennis Weinman Cancer Building will provide fully integrated care in a single facility.

Our new Cancer Building will be able to accommodate the latest technology in an aesthetically pleasing, patient-centered environment where patients can see specialists, get infusions and radiation, and access other supportive services – a comprehensive Cancer Building with a separate entrance and 100 dedicated parking spaces. In addition, pediatric cancer services will be brought together in this world-class facility.

The nature of cancer is changing; more people are getting diagnosed earlier and there are more treatment options available, leading to an ever-growing number of survivors who need ongoing care. They, too, will find it easy to access follow-up appointments, genetic testing, screening exams, and other support services.


The three-level building is being designed in conjunction with clinicians, current and former patients, and frontline staff – incorporating state-of-the-art workflows and desired features. It will include 32 adult infusion bays, 16 adult exam spaces, seven pediatric infusion bays, six pediatric exam spaces, a renovated radiation oncology suite, a dedicated infusion pharmacy, complementary care spaces, a resource center, a meditation center, and community spaces including a teaching kitchen and an appearance center.

"For as long as I can remember, my family and I have been coming to Sinai Hospital for all our healthcare needs," says LifeBridge Health board member and entrepreneur Nupur Parekh Flynn. Indeed, her family has been going to Sinai for more than 25 years.

When Nupur's mother, Bharati Parekh, a businesswoman, artist, and professor, was diagnosed with ovarian cancer, her team of physicians at the Alvin & Lois Lapidus Cancer Institute was there for her. Nupur credits the excellence of Bharati's care team for the more than 10 years she was able to live with the disease. "Whenever we had a question, she could just pick up the phone."

Nupur says Bharati would be thrilled with plans for a new Cancer Building. "She believed in giving back and would encourage donors to help patients experience the same compassion and quality of care that she did in a comfortable and attractive facility – which is essential for healing."




GIVING BRAVELY

EXPANDED SINAI EMERGENCY DEPARTMENT

Sinai Hospital's Emergency Department is at the heart of the community's care. As one of the area's only Level II trauma centers with a dedicated pediatric ED, our consistently high volumes demand a greater and more functional layout designed to maximize care and efficiency.

To reimagine our emergency care, Sinai Emergency Department (ED) staff collaborated with specialized architects to create a modernized, efficient, and patient-centered space. Larger nurse stations allow clinicians to collaborate while facing patients. Wider corridors make it easier to navigate stretchers through hallways. Larger patient rooms accommodate state-ofthe-art equipment, making it easier for staff to provide care while also creating comfortable areas for families at a stressful time. A new intake/triage/results-pending suite provides patients and families with additional privacy, and a new radiology suite enables more timely testing — critical in an emergency care setting.

While no one ever plans to have an emergency, Sinai's new ED will be twice the size of the previous space and

Howard Perlow, chair of the Levindale board, says that, where he lives, he could go to a closer ED, but he and his family always go to Sinai for emergency care. With two sons and one grandchild, he says, the family's gone to the Sinai ED "more times than I care to think about."

Sinai's ED, Howard says, is a community resource that serves everyone, including underinsured patients and local families. Because of this high volume, the ED needs to be expanded so that more patients can receive the same high-quality care as soon as possible.

After all, Howard says, "If there's an emergency, my first thought is Sinai for my family, always."

PROJECT SPOTLIGHT

THE RIGHT CARE AT THE RIGHT TIME: With a new vertical care area, patients who may have sprains or other mild injuries and don't need a bed can get the care they need with speed and efficiency, freeing up beds for those who need them.

A CLEAR PATH OF CARE: Patients will be routed depending on their care path. Patients can be triaged in the waiting room, then guided each step of the way — whether they need a scan or are waiting for results. This journey will help patients understand what is happening and what will happen next.

BUILT-IN FLEXIBILITY: The ED must be prepared to take care of any kind of patient who comes for care, and larger rooms allow for more versatility. More procedures can be performed in-room with extra space for equipment and providers.

PATIENTS AT THE CENTER OF CARE: The new design places the nurses' stations in the center of the floor, allowing them to keep eyes on patients and have greater awareness of any change in condition.

PERSONALIZED CARE: The variety of diagnoses in the ED require input from a wide range of specialists. With telehealth consultations, each patient can be seen by the right expert, leading to more precise care.

Equipping patient rooms with telehealth technology will allow off-site experts to consult when needed — allowing us to diagnose and treat patients promptly with the most appropriate care."

EXPANDED SIMULATION LABS

As part of our ongoing commitment to education, LifeBridge Health is expanding our medical simulation labs at Carroll Hospital, Northwest Hospital, and Sinai Hospital.

With on-site simulation labs, healthcare professionals can learn and practice procedures in a safe, convenient environment. Medical students can learn how to work as a team and master skills through repetition, securely, and under realistic conditions.

Construction of a 4,000-square-foot simulation center at Carroll Hospital is underway. The design includes a four-room simulation center with a large multifunction classroom, surgical suite, ED treatment room, and a labor, delivery, recovery, post-partum, and couplet care patient room.

The Kemper Family Clinical Simulation Center opened at Northwest Hospital in late October 2022. The \$1 million project, a 2,200-square-foot space, includes simulation beds for acute care and critical care, an

operating theater, and a multipurpose area that enables observation, computer training, and debriefing.

At Sinai Hospital, construction of the new Sinai Academic Center will provide more than 13,000 square feet of dedicated rooms for critical care, trauma, procedural, and operating room simulations, a medical library, and classroom and conference areas.



DONOR STORY

When Richard Kemper, chair of the Northwest Hospital Board of Directors, asked what the hospital needed, the answer was: a medical simulation lab. "My wife Louise and I wanted to do something impactful for the operations of the hospital." Richard's involvement with Northwest flows from the gratitude he felt for his mother's end-of-life care. "It was phenomenal. Of course, Northwest is well-known for its people and quality of care."

In the sim lab, clinicians gain knowledge and experience that enhance patient care. For Richard, the lab also expresses care for the caregivers. "I hope the employees feel people are supporting their goals and vision — and motivating them to do even better."

"It's important to set the right example," he says, about his commitment to Northwest Hospital. "We are fortunate that we're able to do this and hope it will inspire others to do whatever they can."

NEW REGIONAL MEDICAL CAMPUS

Sinai Hospital leaders have dreamed of starting a medical school for 100 years — now that dream is becoming a reality.

LifeBridge Health, in partnership with The George Washington University (GW) School of Medicine and Health Sciences, has established GW's first Regional Medical Campus (RMC) at Sinai Hospital. The new entity will attract the region's top medical students and physician leaders who are committed to training our next generation of physicians and caregivers.

At Sinai, each cohort of up to 30 third-year and 30 fourth-year medical students will complete the clinical phase of their medical school program, providing an emphasis on primary and continuity care in a community health environment. The program aims to deliver strong educational experiences and clinical relationships that lead students to continue their training in LifeBridge Health graduate medical education programs and may ultimately lead to employment within our system.
